5. SNAC Report

1. Special CASP Presentation

- Jade Lawsane, an autism consultant, and Pamela Normandin, a special needs consultant gave a very thorough, truly interesting presentation on CASP, Competencybased Approach to Social Participation
- · A new educational program designed by MEES for students with moderate to severe intellectual disabilities between the ages of 6-15
- · It aims to develop students' competencies so that they may participate as fully as possible in society
- Highlights included:
- Focusing on teaching autonomy and self-determination
- Pilot project began at Springdale 3 years ago
- In all elementary and 1 secondary school presently
- · Will expand to all secondary schools next year
- · Presentation included videos demonstrating the effectiveness of the program in real classroom situations
- · Aspects of the CASP approach may have some interesting ramifications for students on modified programs
- The SNAC thanked Jade and Pamela for their thorough presentation and for answering all its questions.

2. Budget Consultation

- · The Budget questions were reviewed
- · A thorough response to all the questions was given with the view to informing Council of SNAC's priorities when the new budget is considered · Highlights include:
- The importance of Staff Training and the Integration of Technology
- Including IEPs and medical forms on Fusion
- Upgrading classroom furniture to provide alternative seating options
- Increasing wheelchair accessibility and providing unisex bathrooms
- Giving teachers the tools to evaluate students through multiple means

3. Extra-Curricular and Field Trip Policy Consultation

- SNAC, after many hours of discussion and reflection, sent in a very comprehensive response to the Consultation
- Priorities include ensuring that:
- · Supervisor/student ratios do not include an Aid when that Aid is responsible for 1 or 2 students on a field trip
- · Simplifying the Authorization for School Activity form

4. Parent to Parent Workshop

- The topic to present is titled "The Art and Science of the IEP Process Promoting Parental Engagement on our Children's Education"
- The workshop is open to all parents with students on an IEP
- It will be held on March 27 at 7:00 P.M. in the Boardroom

6. Facilities & Security Committee Meeting

Rental of Facilities Presentation:

B. Côté presented the report of the Rentals Department as prepared by A. Kaley including an overview of the income statement for the current year. In addition, the Committee was informed that a realignment of our rental rates is required. The suggested option would allow us to attract new customers and retain current customers. The rental rate proposal for the 2018 - 2019 year will be set out in a resolution to be forwarded to Council for adoption at its March meeting

Ventilation Cleaning:

B. Côté informed the Committee that additional funds for operating projects was made available by the Ministry with a requirement that the money be committed for contracts entered into before the end of March 2018. The suggestion is to proceed to the cleaning of ventilation ducts in schools. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$750,000.00 with approximately \$400,000.00 coming from the Ministry and \$350,000.00 from energy savings realized this year. A resolution will be presented to Council at its next meeting.

Building Security:

B. Côté informed the Committee that the Board will be upgrading the locks in our schools over the next few years in order to provide for greater security in the event of an incident. The locks can be locked and unlocked from outside as usual with a key but also can be locked and unlocked from the inside. The cost per school is reasonable especially in view of the protection afforded to the students and staff.

Modern Classrooms

B. Côté made a short presentation to the Committee on the thinking about the design of innovative spaces as classrooms of the future as we make renovations in schools on

a going forward basis. At the present time there is no firm plan in place but there may be a pilot project at a local elementary school which is to be the object of a major capital renewal.
